ATTENDANCE

in the early grades

Many of our youngest students miss 10 percent of the school year—about 18 days a year or just two days every month. Chronic absenteeism in kindergarten, and even preK, can predict lower test scores, poor attendance and retention in later grades, especially if the problem persists for more than a year. Do you know how many young children are chronically absent in your school or community?




Who Is Affected

Kindergarten and 1st grade classes often have absenteeism rates as high as those in high school. Many of these absences are excused, but they still add up to lost time in the classroom.

1 in 10 kids

in kindergarten and 1st grade are chronically absent. In some schools, it's as high as 1 in $4.^{\rm 1}$



2 in 10 low-income kids

miss too much school. They're also more likely to suffer academically.¹ 2.5 in 10 homeless kids

are chronically absent.²

4 in 10 transient kids

miss too much school when families move.²



Why It Matters

If children don't show up for school regularly, they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills and the chance to build a habit of good attendance that will carry them into college and careers.

Preliminary data from a California study found that children who were chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade were far less likely to read proficiently at the end of 3rd grade.

What We Can Do



Engage Families

Many parents and students don't realize how quickly early absences can add up to academic trouble. Community members and teachers can educate families and build a culture of attendance through early outreach, incentives and attention to data.



Fix Transportation

The lack of a reliable car, or simply missing the school bus, can mean some students don't make it to class. Schools, transit agencies and community partners can organize car pools, supply bus passes or find other ways to get kids to school.



Address Health Needs

Health concerns, particularly asthma and dental problems, are among the leading reasons students miss school in the early grades. Schools and medical professionals can work together to give children and families health care and advice.



Track the Right Data

Schools too often overlook chronic absence because they track average attendance or unexcused absences, not how many kids miss too many days for any reason. Attendance Works has free data-tracking tools.

These are a few steps that communities and schools can take. How do you think you can help?

Wrenshall's Steadily Increasing Enrollment

AND THE PROCESS FOR OPEN ENROLLMENT APPLICATIONS

TARGET CLASS SIZES TO ENSURE QUALITY INSTRUCTION

The Wrenshall Board of Education has established target class sizes to ensure quality instruction. Those established targets are:

- · Preschool-Kindergarten = 20
- · Grades 1-3 = 23
- · Grades 4-6 = 25
- · Grades 7-8 = 28
- · High School = 30 for most classes

OPENING AND CLOSING GRADES, ADDING SECTIONS

Since the above targets were established early in 2024, enrollment has been steadily increasing. The Board proactively closed grades 2, 4, 5, and 6 to open enrollment from outside of the district boundaries on June 10th in accordance with Minnesota Statute 124D.03. The Board is likely to add an additional Kindergarten and 4th grade section at their August 12th meeting. That would likely lead to Grade 4 being available for open enrollment again on that date.

PROCESS FOR ACCEPTING OPEN ENROLLMENT APPLICATIONS

Per statute, a wait list for each closed grade shall be established to provide for a nondiscriminatory and orderly process for accepting open enrollment applications without creating undue hardship upon the District's resources and its capacity to provide a Free and Appropriate Public Education to all students served. The following preference criteria will be applied to open enrollment wait list applicants during the 2024-2025 school year:

- Applicants whose parent or legal guardian is a current employee of Independent District No. 100.
- 2. Applicants for which a sibling or member of the

- same household has been accepted for open enrollment in a grade level which has not been closed by resolution.
- 3. Applicants not meeting the above criteria will be offered open enrollment opportunities when available based on the earliest date on which their completed General Statewide Enrollment Options Application for K-12 and Early Childhood Special Education was received by the District.

Applicants offered open enrollment must complete enrollment within ten (10) days of the District's notification and transportation may be offered, although not required beyond the District's boundaries as described in statute.

The open enrollment process in Minnesota can be very complicated. Please don't hesitate to contact the Wrenshall School office at (218) 384-4274 x2000 for assistance in completing open enrollment applications. Students residing within the Wrenshall School District boundaries are welcome to enroll immediately year-round without exception.



WRENSHALL CITY COUNCIL May 8, 2024, 5:00 p.m. Regular Meeting

The meeting started with a call from city auditors Clasen & Schiessl. Susan Schiessl gave an overview of the 2023 audit. Motion by Martindale; seconded by Butala to accept the 2023 audit as presented. Motion carried.

Motion by Mattinen; seconded by Gvesrude to approve the agenda as presented. Motion carried.

Motion by Butala; seconded by Martindale to approve the Consent Agenda including minutes from the Regular Council Meeting on April 3, 2024 and the Special Meeting on April 16, 2024, and checks as follows: Pre-paids: #30929-#30945=\$11,475.73; Payroll: #30946-#30955=\$7,291.36; April bills: 05/08/24-1 thru-3 and 30957-30978=\$28,597.09; and Electronic Transfers: 04/04/24-1 &-2 and ETFR24-03=\$3,325.79. Surface Specialists will do the repair when the weather allows. A report on the condition of city streets was reviewed.

Maintenance: Northland has indicated the new axel was installed on the tractor and they are working on the loader mounts. School Board Member Ben Johnson was at the meeting to ask for the city's support. The Career and Technical Education Program is pursuing a grant to build a 3BR/2BA home in Pleasant View Estates as a class project. Motion by Mattinen; seconded by Martindale to waive the \$2,100 tower fee for the Wrenshall School, a public institution, to support the district in serving its educational goals. Gvesrude-Yes; Ziebarth-Absent; Mattinen-Yes; Martindale-Yes; Butala-Yes. Motion carried.

Planning Commission: Motion by Mattinen; seconded by Gvesrude to approve the fence permit received for 902 North Woodhaven. Motion carried unanimously. Motion by Mattinen; seconded by Martindale to approve the fence permit for 412 Pleasant View Court. Motion carried with Gvesrude abstaining. The residents living south of the city hall came to the meeting to ask about letting the area on the west side of their property grow into a buffer. Discussion was tabled.

Bollig Engineering: Nathan Feist stated that it is Bollig's position that they will only attend meetings if they are working on a project or if requested by the council. The PER has been delayed. Because of the higher median income in the city grant opportunities and financing needed to be reviewed with David Drown Associates before the report can be finalized. Motion by Butala; seconded by Mattinen to approve TO#4 for Bollig to begin the work needed with Silversmith to record GIS and other information on sewer infrastructure. Motion carried. A new task order to review drainage of ponds in Pleasant View Estates and Mason ditches was presented the city's proposal to Don Proulx and the outcome of the budget work session in August.

Water Operator: Work on the tower and televising/jetting the last section of city water lines is still planned for 2024, but there has been no contact on work dates. Fire hydrant repair has also been arranged, but no specific date has been set.

Clerk: The office has received repeated requests to be able to make payments for water/sewer billing, building permits and other fees with credit cards. Motion by Butala; seconded by Gvesrude to contract with Municipay for this service. There is no cost to the city for this service. Motion carried. Earned Safe and Sick Time (ESST) laws have been clarified and requirements do not apply to volunteer fire fighters. City staff met with Mike Strodtman of Minnesota Rural Water (MRWA) on the Wellhead Protection (WHP) program. Work on Wrenshall's plan amendment has been slowed by delays at the Minnesota Department of Health. Filing for Office will take place from July 30, 2024, through August 13, 2024.

Maintenance: The electrical inspector was here July 9, 2024, and approved the service for the new building and the windshield has been replaced on the tractor. Painting of curbs and crosswalks will start in the next few weeks.


